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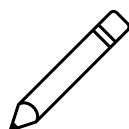
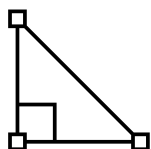

Afternoon short break	3:25 pm	3:40 pm

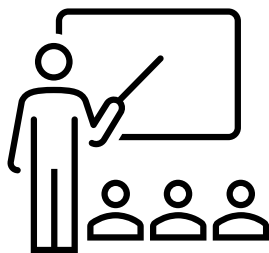
For schools that follow international programmes, lessons will start at 8:30 am and end according to their respective programmes.

TEACHERS' SALARY INCREMENT

The Government of Rwandan through the Ministry of Education increased teachers' salary on 88% for A2 holders and 40 % for A1 and A0 holders respectively.

COMMUNIQUE

The Ministry of Education is pleased to announce that following the Cabinet meeting of 29 July 2022, which discussed strategies to improve the welfare of teachers, including access to finance through Umwarimu SACCO; promoting the quality of education in public and government-aided schools for general education and TVET; the following decisions have been taken:

1. To allocate 5 billion FRW to Umwarimu SACCO in order to strengthen liquidity conditions and access to finance by teachers.
2. To increase salaries for teachers as follows:
 - I. For a teacher recruited and paid on basis of A2 certificate (total of 68,207 teachers) will increase by 88% of net starting salary or 50,849 FRW ;
 - II. For a teacher recruited and paid on basis of A1 diploma (total of 12,214 teachers) will increase by 40% of net starting salary or 54,916 FRW;
 - III. For a teacher recruited and paid on basis of A0 degree (total of 17,547 teachers) will increase by 40% of net starting salary or 70,195 FRW.
3. The salaries for Head Teachers, Deputy Head Teachers, and support staff working in public and government-aided schools have been also revised upwards.

These decisions come into force from the payment of the teacher salaries of August 2022.

The Ministry of Education has harmonized school fees in Public and Government subsidized schools.



Guidelines on Contribution of Parents to Pre-primary, Primary and Secondary School Education

Kigali, 14 September 2022 – As part of the Government's commitment to equitable access to quality education, the Ministry of Education supports public and government-subsidized schools by providing a capitation grant per child, to complement parents' contribution. This is based on law N° 010/2021 of 16/02/2021 that governs education in Rwanda.

In order to end significant disparities in parents' contribution across Rwandan schools, which is often an obstacle for families with limited resources, the Ministry of Education issues the following instructions to harmonize the contribution of parents to the education of their children in public and government-subsidized schools; pre-primary, primary, secondary schools of general and professional education; and Technical Schools, as follows:

When necessary and following review and approval by parents' general assembly, contributions for other school needs shall not exceed 7,000 Rwf per term.

For schools that rent mattress to students as bedding requirement, it is permitted to charge only new students a contribution not exceeding 9,000 Rwf, which is to be paid only once in three years to enable the replacement of old mattresses.

No public or government subsidized school is allowed to request students for other materials that are not in the list contained in this document.

Every student must wear an authorized school uniform while at school, or when traveling from or to school. The school is responsible for determining the color, style, and design of the school uniform. However, the fabric of the school uniform must be a solid color. No parent is obligated to buy school uniforms or any other material from their child's school, but they can if they wish to do so.

These instructions will be implemented starting with the 2022/2023 school year, with an exception of the uniform instruction to be implemented within the 2023/2024 school year. Should a school face specific challenges in the implementation of these instructions, upon a request by the parents' general assembly, these will be assessed and decided on by the Ministry of Education.

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ZIMBABWEAN EDUCATIONAL PERSONNEL

The Ministry of Education received Zimbabwean Education Personnel



Kigali, 20th October 2022: The Minister of State in Charge of ICT and TVET Hon Claudette Irere opened a three-day orientation workshop for 154 recruited Zimbabwean educational personnel who arrived in Kigali the day before in a delegation led by Hon. Lovemore Matuke, Deputy Minister of Public Service Labour and Social Welfare of the Republic of Zimbabwe, and Her Excellency Prof. Charity Manyeruke, Ambassador of Zimbabwe in Rwanda.

Present at the event were also the Permanent Secretary of Rwanda Ministry of Education Mr. Charles Karakye, the Director General of Rwanda Education Board Dr. Nelson Mbarushimana and other Ministry's staff at the central level and Affiliated Agencies.

In her opening remarks at the orientation workshop, Minister of State / ICT and TVET Hon. Claudette Irere welcomed the Zimbabwean recruited education personnel and appreciated the partnership between Rwanda and Zimbabwe as this recruitment proves a long-lasting cooperation between the two nations.



She also pledged support from the Rwandan community and the Government during all their stay in Rwanda.

The 154 Zimbabwean educational personnel – of whom 96 are males and 58 are females are in Rwanda following a

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed on 23rd December 2021 between the Ministry of Education of the Republic of Rwanda (MINEDUC) and the Ministry of Public Service, Labour, and Social Welfare of the Republic of Zimbabwe with the aim of exchanging educational personnel and expertise upon request of any of the Parties.

Their recruitment was made in collaboration with MIFOTRA, MINEDUC jointly with the Ministry of Public Service, Labour, and Social Welfare of the Republic of Zimbabwe whereby written and oral examinations were done by the Zimbabwean candidates through e-recruitment system, they were given offer to work in Rwanda after successfully meeting all the requirements.

Their contracts allow them to work for two years renewable upon satisfactory performance, and they will be deployed in various institutions as follows:

- ❖ 135 in 16 Teacher Training Colleges (TTCs)
- ❖ 6 trainers in 3 Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) schools with rare skills requirements
- ❖ 11 trainers in 3 Integrated Polytechnic Regional Centres (IPRC)
- ❖ 3 university lecturers will teach in the University of Rwanda - College of Medicine and Health Sciences (UR-CMHS)

While closing the first day of the orientation workshop, the Minister of State in Charge of Primary and Secondary Education Hon. Gaspard Twagirayezu thanked Zimbabwean Educational Personnel for their commitment to join Rwandan Teaching working Force; He also wished them the best and successful journey in Rwanda.

Before they depart for their respective workplaces on 22 October 2022, all the Zimbabwean delegation also visited Kigali Genocide Memorial and Campaign against Genocide Museum in Kigali City to have an insight of the Rwandan history.

World Teachers' Day

Prime Minister NGIRENTE Presided over the World Teachers' Day Celebration



Kigali, November 2, 2022- Prime Minister Dr. Edouard Ngirente joined over 7,000 teachers from across the country for the celebration of the World Teachers' Day. This ceremony took place at BK Arena in Kigali.

Prime Minister started his remarks by conveying the message from President Paul Kagame that the Government of Rwanda fully supports teachers. He noted that World Teachers' Day is a good opportunity to appreciate the important role that teachers play in the development of countries.

In this regard, he reminded teachers that they have a key role to play for Rwanda to achieve its target of becoming of knowledge-based economy.

Prime Minister urged teachers to be committed to improving ICT and English language skills as well as embracing innovation in education to improve the quality of Education. He also called upon teachers to have discipline and adopt good behaviours because they are role models for students and communities.

In a bid to reduce classroom congestion, Prime Minister stated that the Government will continue investing in school construction as well as recruit competent and committed teachers to reduce students per teacher ratio.

PM also insisted that the government will continue subsidize school fees for students in Teacher Training Colleges (TTCs) to attract the best teachers in the education system and further advance the teaching profession. He also encouraged Head Teachers to ensure the effective implementation of the school feeding program and avoid misusing and embezzling school properties and assets.

National Examinations Results

MINEDUC through National Examinations and School Inspection Authority (NESA) Released National Examinations results

PRIMARY 6 AND SENIOR 3



Kigali - 27th September 2022: The Ministry of Education (MINEDUC) has released results for Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) and Ordinary Level (O'Level) for candidates who did national examinations for the academic year 2021-2022.

The event took place at the Ministry of Education headquarters and officiated by Minister of Education, Minister of State in charge of Primary and Secondary Education and Minister of State in charge of ICT and TVET and other Director Generals of Affiliated Agencies and was livestreamed via MINEDUC YouTube Channel.

The total number of candidates who sat for 2021-2022 Academic Year National Exams were 227,402 and 206,286 of them passed, which represents 90.69 per cent of the general passing rate.

Results for O' Level indicates that among the 126,735 candidates who sat for national exams, 108,566 passed which represents 85.66 percent.

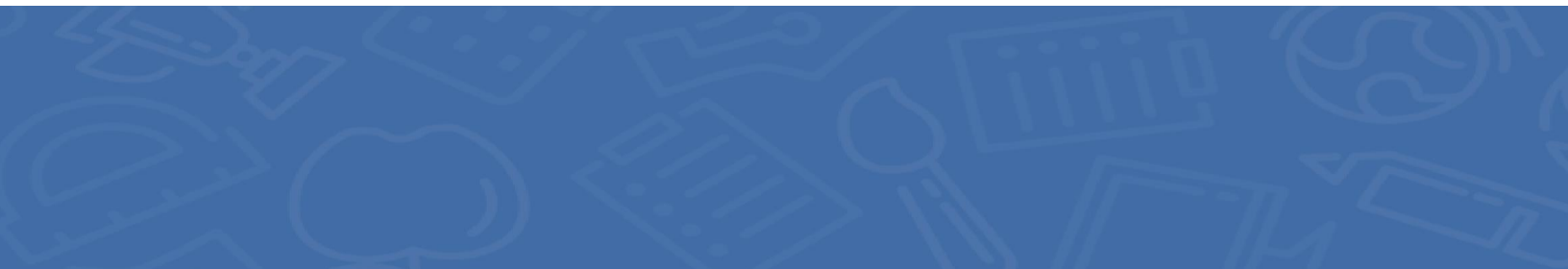

Change in grading System

The new grading system from PLE, O level and advanced level, the well-known Grade value “one” is no longer the highest. The highest is now grade value “six”. A student can score in each subject, and the lowest being grade value “0” which wasn’t there before. Initially, lowest grades were characterized by the letter “F” which stands for “failure.”

For example, in Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) the highest total aggregate is 30 because the high value in each of 5 subjects is 6. For Ordinary level (O’Level), the highest total aggregate is 54, because the high value in each 9 compulsory subjects is 6. For Advanced level or S6, the highest total aggregates is 60, in General Education, Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and Teacher’s Training Colleges (TTC).

For the Ordinary, or O level all nine subjects are compulsory and will be counted and the best candidate will score a total aggregate of 54, equivalent to 6 marks in nine subjects.

SENIOR 6 EXAMINATIONS RESULTS



Kigali, 15 December 2022: the Minister of State in Charge of Primary and Secondary Education Gaspard Twagirayezu together with the Minister of State in Charge of ICT & TVET Claudette Irere announced the 2021-2022 examinations results for S6 General Education, TTC and TVET/Level 5.



Speaking at the ceremony, the Minister of State Gaspard Twagirayezu said, “We want to congratulate students, parents and teachers for this achievement, the journey was not easy, but our dear students managed to perform well.” He further added that all this would not have possible without the involvement of teachers and parents who tirelessly did their part to support the students.

This year's performance:

A total number of candidates in general education is 47,606; while in TVET/ L5, candidates are 21,340; and TTCs candidates are 2,907.

The best candidates in General education, TVET and TTCs level countrywide. All these 16 students were accompanied by their parents or guardians and each student was awarded a laptop to help them upgrade their ICT skills and knowledge.

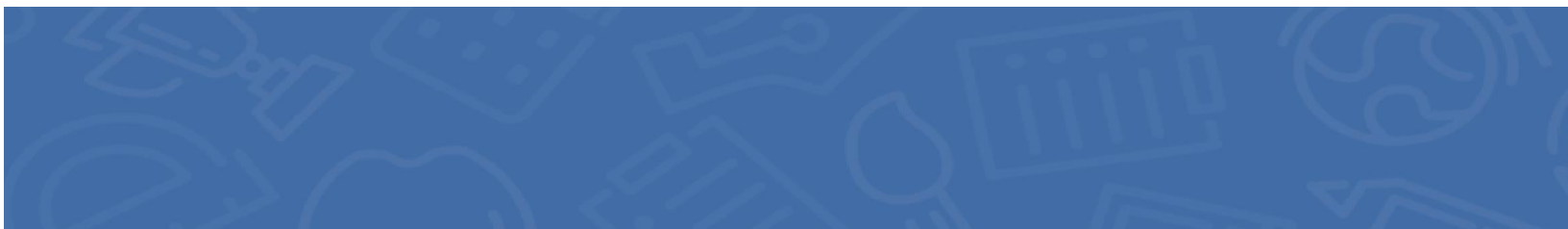

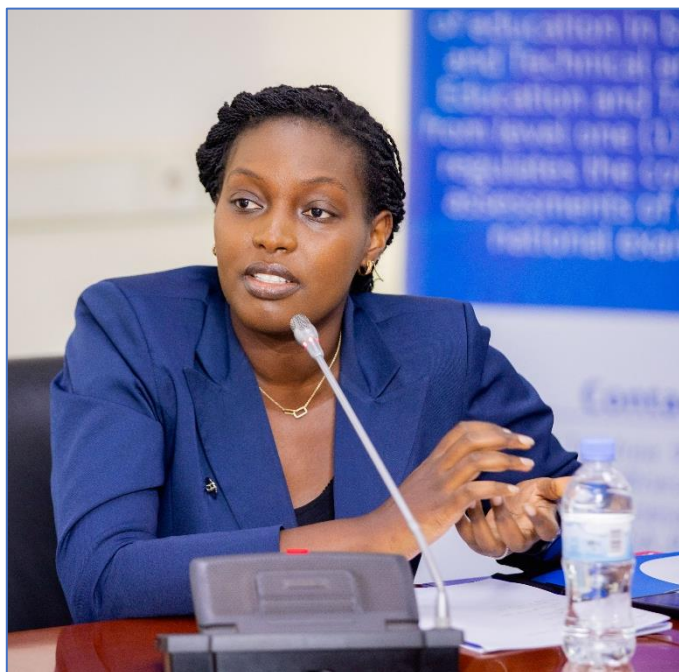

In her closing remarks, Hon Claudette Irere said “We thank each and everyone who worked towards the success of this event, we are working hard so that in the future publication of national exams results doesn’t take long”.

Grading system revised:
According to Dr. Bahati Bernard the Director General of NESA a revised grading system was used.

Except for TVET and TTC practical examinations as well as subsidiary subjects, examinable subjects are graded on a seven (7) grade point scale with six (6) as the highest (excellent) and zero (0) as the lowest (fail). TVET and TTC Practical Examinations and Subsidiary subjects are graded on a two-point scale with six (6) and Zero (0) as well as with one (1) and Zero (0) respectively.

The maximum weighted aggregate achieved by a candidate who has excelled in all examinable subjects is sixty (60) while the minimum weighted aggregate achieved by a successful candidate is nine (9). For TVET and TTC, passing a practical examination at a grade level of ‘A’ is a “PASS” condition.

UR Graduation

Prime Minister attended the 8th graduation ceremony of the University of Rwanda

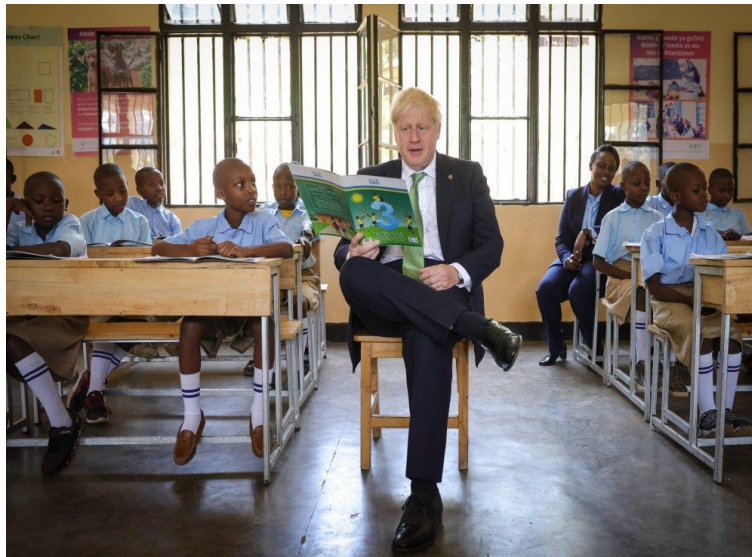
a member of the Commonwealth under the theme: Painting the values of the Commonwealth.
